From the Pastor

I recently came across a lovely article, quite by chance, by a palliative care physician, Simran Malhotra, who works in Baltimore. The interviewer asked her about what people said at the end of their lives about what's most important to them.

It's a cliché, but true: we're all dying. When we embrace this truth (rather than run from it), we can live with greater freedom and purpose to our living. But those who know they're in their final days have much to teach us.

There was a commercial that proclaimed, "You only go 'round once in life, so grab for all the gusto you can." Brought to you over 50 years ago from your friends at Schlitz Brewing in Milwaukee. Life is limited, therefore they thought we should "grab" what we can while we're here. Including one of their cold beers.

Dr. Malhotra said what people regret most wasn't grabbing enough, but (1) not spending more time with loved ones, "including years lost with a loved one due to a trivial disagreement"; (2) spending too much time at work; and (3) not pursuing a life most true to their passions and gifts, rather than trying to live up to the expectations of others.

Here's my take on *regret* at the end of life: live long enough, we will all have them. The longer we live, the more days we have to see life more clearly. We see that the best things in life aren't things, it's life itself, and the people God gives to us. God created us for one another — yes, our families and

friends, but also our beloved communities of mutual care and support (like St. James!), and even the stranger you bump into today.

The Episcopal priest and author, Alan Jones, once said that life is really a "school of love." That helps me understand that we're here not to achieve or amass, but to learn (practice, practice) how to love in our living and giving and forgiving.

Dr. Malhotra said: "Don't be afraid to face your fears and embrace your vulnerabilities. These are the things that make us human and connect us to others. They are what make us real and raw and beautiful. In the end, we are all just human beings desperately searching for connection, love and meaning in our lives. We want to be seen, heard and understood. We want to know that we matter. That our lives have mattered."

As hard as it can be (especially when a child is dying), it can be a sacred privilege to walk with those who are at the end of their days. When I do so as a pastor, we might take time to look back at their life, but my presence also points them to the One who gives us hope to look forward.

We've all journeyed through Covid and have a greater sense how precious and fragile life is. To live is to love, and to love is to be vulnerable. Living in Christ means we live


inside a story, a story with a promise at the center: the One who died for us is the very same One risen from the dead. Jesus is our hope. And where Jesus is, death has lost its sting.

IRA Transfers

If you are age 72 or older, you have another opportunity. You can transfer funds directly from your IRA to St. James Lutheran Church. Such a transfer is not reportable income to you and can meet your required minimum distribution for the year. Such transfers are limited to \$100,000 per year and not deductible as a charitable donation but have the potential to reduce your tax bill because there is no reportable income. This way of giving can be helpful even if you don't itemize. Thank you for considering St. James in your gift planning.


INSTRUMENTALISTS WANTED!

The first book selection of the year is My Name Is Edward by Annemarie Topel. Unwanted and neglected since birth, Edward struggles to find his way in the world. Wit the death of the grandmother who was raising him, Edward is left with no one. Eventually, he is forced to take to the streets where he finds that his struggles are more than just fighting to survive. Battling internal demons and unable to trust, the hope he fought hard to hang onto fades, and he begins to lose his grip.

Ann, a high-powered businesswoman with barely enough hours in the day to manage her own busy life, stumbles upon Edward while taking a detour to work one morning. Something about him grabs her deep within her soul and draws her to him. While their lives look nothing alike on the surface, it isn't long before their shared pain and many parallels are exposed. As Ann fights to save Edward, she discovers that their chance meeting irrevocably changes both their lives and that helping him might be more about helping herself. My Name Is Edward is a story of fiction inspired, in part, by true events.



The author, Annemarie Topel, will be joining the book group discussion in October. Annemarie lives in Milwaukee where she spent four decades in the broadcast industry before retiring in 2020 to pursue her passion for writing.




Verona Area Kids Expo:
