From Pastor Peter

Last summer I presided at a burial at the cemetery of East Lemonweir Lutheran Church, about seven miles west of Mauston.

East Lemonweir Lutheran Church was founded in 1854, and was first served by Pastor H.A. Preus, who could come only once or twice a year. On his first visit he was literally carried across Brewer's Creek, as there was no nearby bridge. A member of the church, Knud Ormson, stayed the night on the opposite side to guard the horses and buggy.

Apparently 1854 was outlaw time in Wisconsin.

H.A. Preus eventually became president of the Synod of the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Church (one of our predecessor bodies) for 32 years, as well as one of the seven pastors who in 1853 organized it. He was also there to lay a cornerstone at the founding of my alma mater, St. Olaf College.

The current structure that serves the community of East Lemonweir was built some years later. Painted above the outdoor entrance, in Norwegian, is the first verse from Ecclesiastes 5:

Forvar din Fod naar du vil gaar til Guds Hus. ("Guard your steps when you go to the house of God.")

"Guard your steps" is not a warning to keep people from tripping as they walked up the stairs. The verse continues: To draw near to listen is better than to offer the sacrifice of fools, for they do not know that they are doing evil.

Well, maybe it's a warning against tripping after all.

Think about it — that verse is what members of East Lemonweir see every time they enter, a simple reminder about conducting themselves as they entered worship where they would listen, week in and week out over years which turned into decades, the Good News of Jesus Christ.

In worship we "offer our sacrifice of thanks and praise," it is true. But we're foolish if we think worship is primarily what we do for God, rather than what God does for us. It's why everything we do begins with "receive," for God is the one who both gives life and then restores it. It's all a gift, from start to eternity.

We are no different from East Lemonweir Lutheran Church, once an outpost for new immigrants, struggling to find a place, build a space, and then live out the mission of welcoming and learning, gathering and serving.

Pastor Narum Farewell Gift: Undue Medical Debt

Please help us reach our goal of \$10,000 to help ease \$2.4 million dollars worth of medical debt. It is a marvelous way to give and significantly and positively impact the lives of others.



<u>Undue Medical Debt</u>, a 501c3 Non-Profit, identifies people facing financial hardship (earnings are four times below the federal poverty level and who have medical debt that is 5 percent or more of their annual income) and uses your gifts to purchase discounted medical debt at an average of \$1 for \$100 of debt. Those individuals then receive a letter notifying them that their debt has been forgiven, tax-free. The debt relief can them help restore their credit, pay for basic necessities, and save for financial goals.

UMD acquires debt in large bundles from providers like hospitals and physician groups, as well as from collection agencies and debt buyers, millions of dollars at a time for a fraction of the face value. This means your donation relieves about 100x or more its value in medical debt. Please send or place in the offering plate your check made out to St. James Lutheran Church, and include "Undue Medical Debt" on the memo line. You may also give online on the website.

An Interim Pastor's Thoughts about Summertime Worship

BREAD BAKERS NEEDED!

Many of you appreciated having baked bread for Holy Communion during the Lenten season. Some have asked whether we might continue to share bread in this way. In response, we plan to offer baked bread at worship one weekend per month during the summer. If you are able to help with bread baking, please contact the church office at 608-845-6922. The recipe is below. Thank you!

LUTHER SEMINARY'S COMMUNION BREAD RECIPE

Sift dry ingredients (important!) together three times:

2 c whole wheat flour 1 c white flour 1 & 1/4 tsp baking powder 1 & 1/4 tsp salt

Stir in 4 tsp oil. Set aside.

Mix wet ingredients together until dissolved:

3/4 cup + 2 Tbsp very hot water (minimum of 180 degrees F)

3 Tbsp honey

3 Tbsp molasses

Add wet ingredients to dry ingredients and mix well. Dough should be slightly sticky. Do not knead.

Divide into four balls and flatten each into a 1/4 inch thick disk.





With a knife, score the top of each loaf into eight pie-shaped sections, so that the sections can be more easily broken off while serving. Alternatively, you could score a cross onto the loaf.

Lay the loaves on a baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove from oven and brush the tops of the loaves with oil. Bake an additional 5-8 minutes. Let cool.

Yield: four 8 oz. loaves. Each loaf serves 60-70 people, depending upon the size of the piece given. The loaves freeze well.

"Prayground" Coming to Worship This Summer!

We're excited to share a new initiative we'll be exploring this summer: a "Prayground" within our worship space. As a church, we are committed to making worship accessible, welcoming and meaningful for all, including our youngest members, and we believe that incorporating a dedicated space for young children can enhance the worship experience for everyone.

What is a Prayground?

A Prayground is a designated space near the front of the sanctuary where young children can experience worship through age-appropriate materials and tools that will help keep them engaged in what is happening — materials such as children's Bibles and books, coloring/drawing materials, soft toys and manipulatives, and items related to the scripture theme such as smooth stones, feathers, shells, etc.

Why a Prayground?

- Children learn to worship by being IN worship. They acquire the "language" of worship by listening to and observing the words the adults around them say, especially through the rituals, repetition and music of worship. In addition, children are able to process what they hear more effectively when they have something to do with their hands.
- Praygrounds help children access worship.
- They help parents access worship, especially for churches who are not able to staff a nursery.
- They can be a useful tool that makes it clear that children and families are welcome and have a place in the sanctuary.
- Children can see what is going on and remain more engaged, attentive and respectful.

We understand that there may be some concerns about noise or distractions. We are planning to thoughtfully design the prayground with quiet activities and materials that will minimize disruptions to the worship service.

Over the past ten years, churches in the area and across the country have successfully added praygrounds to their worship spaces. One example is Grace Lutheran Church in Apple Valley, Minnesota. Helpful information and photos can be found on their website: https://graceofav.org/prayground/

We are excited about the potential of the prayground to enhance our worship experience and create a more welcoming and inclusive space for all members of our congregation. Please feel free to share your thoughts and questions with us as we move forward with a trial run this summer. Israel's extreme violence in Gaza and the West Bank is uprooting entire communities, destroying homes, displacing civilians, many of them children, and depriving inhabitants of food, water, shelter and medical care. This violence is putting the continued existence of the entire Gazan people at risk and making each day a struggle for their survival. The question is no longer when peace will come, but whether the people of Gaza and the West Bank will survive long enough to see it. This presentation aims to shed light on the lived experiences of Palestinians under siege, the international silence surrounding their suffering and the resilience they continue to show in the face of what many are calling a slow, unfolding genocide. It will also lift up some of the resistance to Israel's action in Gaza that is going on around the world.

Rev. El-Yateem, a highly respected Arab-American leader and community organizer, was born in Bethlehem in 1968 and emigrated to the United States in 1992. He holds a Master of Divinity degree from the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, and a bachelor's degree from the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Cairo. One of Rev. El-Yateem's primary focuses is promoting open dialogue and unity, especially among Christians, Jews and Muslims.

Rev. El-Yateem serves as Executive Director for Service and Justice at the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Prior to this appointment, Rev. El Yateem served as the Assistant to the Bishop and the Director for Evangelical Mission in the Florida-Bahamas Synod of the ELCA.

Measure of Our Commitment - thru April 30, 2025


For the first four months of 2025, we are BOTH on track with giving and spending is also within the expense budget. YTD Operating Envelopes Receipts are **FAVORABLE** to budget by \$1,033 or +0.5% and are also running ahead of the the prior year by \$11,911 or +6.6%. With YTD expense spending in line with budget, the net result of receipts less expenses is at \$6,896 YTD, which is **FAVORABLE** to budget by \$3,414.
